Ministry of Bishop Leslie II and Naomi Francisco celebrated

The legacy of Bishop Leslie W. II and his widow, Naomi (Rowe Taylor) Francisco was remembered and honored on September 9, as 92 guests joined in a "Celebration of Ministry" banquet at the Point Plaza Hotel in Newport News, Va. L.W. Francisco II was the first black pastor of Calvary Mennonite Church, which later merged with and became known as Calvary Community Church. This congregation, which is now one of the largest Mennonite churches in the denomination, began as an outreach of the Warwick River Mennonite Church among African American children in the late 1920s and early 1930s. Nelson & Dorothy Burkholder and John D. & Esther Mabel Yoder generously sponsored the banquet. Nelson, who is more than 90 years old, initially served as the lead pastor of Calvary Mennonite Church. He then became co-pastor with Leslie Francisco II. In 1971 Leslie II took over as lead pastor while Nelson continued on as his assistant.

The evening included a delicious prime rib buffet with baked chicken, sweet and mashed potatoes, along with salads, mixed vegetables and assorted desserts. Granddaughter Nichole R. Francisco emceed while other members of the Francisco family sang, prayed and gave testimonies. Nelson D. Burkholder, Ernest Godshall (overseer for the Eastern District of Virginia), Sylvia Gorman (an active member at Calvary for several decades) and Lloyd Weaver (former overseer for the Calvary Mennonite Church and Warwick District) reflected on the life and ministry of the Franciscos. Several others gave testimonies to God's anointing on the Franciscos, including Naomi's brother Sam Taylor.

All three of the Francisco children; sons Leslie W. III, Steven (who received his eternal rest on July 6, 2004) and Myron, along with their spouses, caught their parent's vision and are actively involved in Christian ministry. L. W. Francisco III serves as Bishop of the Calvary District while his

wife, Pastor Natalie A. Francisco, serves as Administrator of Programs and Personnel, as well as the Minister of Music at Calvary Community Church.

The Francisco legacy is still having an impact on the community. Calvary Community Church continues to grow. They, in turn, have planted 5 churches including one in Texas and one in South Africa. Closer to home, the Harvest of Judah Fellowship, Calvary Community Chesapeake and Fellowship of Christ congregations grew out of Calvary's ministry.

Those gathered, along with several who sent gifts in L. W. II and Naomi Francisco's honor, contributed nearly \$4,100 for Virginia Mennonite Conference's ministries. These gifts were matched with a \$4,100 contribution by VMC to the newly formed Calvary District Ministerial Training and Trust Fund which will help train established and emerging church leaders in the Calvary District.

This small book contains “lively ideas, common sense, profound wisdom, and plain good humor that he has gathered” from various sources. Reading it in bits and pieces is like getting a cool drink on a warm day, or a hot drink on a cold day.

One of the treasures I found is this line from John A. Shedd: “A ship in harbor is safe, but that is not

what ships are made for.” Ah, a line with a punch of truth!

Our world is seeking to be safe while all around there is fear from the violence occurring in other countries and our own. The war in the Middle East, the famine and slaughter in Congo, the shooting of the Amish girls in Pennsylvania—all strike fear deep into our minds and hearts. We hold our loved ones close, and pray, and shrink into our safe places.

But can we push out of the harbor, away from the tethers of comfort and home? Americans are accustomed to climate-controlled living spaces, to a constant supply of hot and cold water and electricity, and to paved roads. Living in another country and adjusting to less-than-ideal conditions stretches our coping skills.

A dynamic world is waiting for the priceless cargo on the ship—hope for the future found in Jesus Christ accompanied by food, medicine, and community development. We can encourage each other in opening the sails of our lives, welcoming the winds of the Spirit to billow the sails, and arriving at the harbors that have been watching and waiting for Hope to arrive. That’s what our ships are made for.

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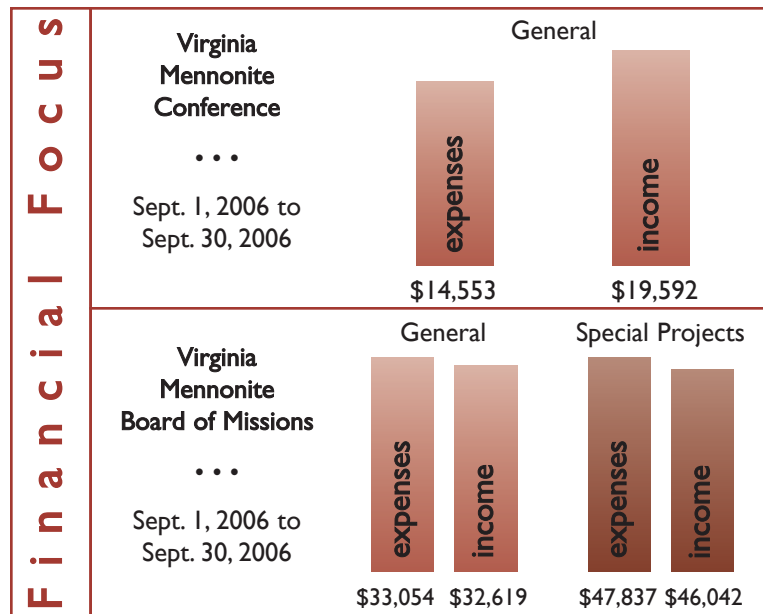

Giving up on guns

Rafael*, a visitor from Haiti last year, couldn't imagine that nearly everyone here has a gun. He didn't really understand about hunting; he only saw guns as being used to kill others. In Haiti, he had been offered a good job for the French Embassy where he would have to carry a gun. When he got there and realized that he would have to carry a gun, he said no. He said, "I don't do guns." He desperately needed the money such a job could have given him. We were proud of his decision.

Near our mission in Haiti, there was a missionary from another church who carried a pistol. At one point, some Haitians claimed that they had held the land before the missionary came in and took it. So they hired police to come in and take it back. In the process, one of the missionary's helpers was shot and killed.

Later, Bill* (one of our missionaries) talked with this other missionary and tried to tell him that he didn't believe in using weapons. This didn't seem to mean anything to him. In fact, this other missionary hired a bunch of police and a judge and took the land back again with force. Now, he is building a gigantic church there.

Upon seeing this example, a Haitian pastor living close to Rafael and our mission told Rafael that he wanted his house and clinic. He hired the police to come in and run him out, because of the influence of this other missionary. In the process, one of the boys that cooked there was killed. They found him later floating in the river. Rafael could have gone to the law and done something, like trying to take it back again by force. But Rafael said that he "decided to let the Lord deal with him [the pastor]." He realized that it was time to break the cycle rather than to continue it.

Guns can really get you into trouble. Some people plan to kill if someone breaks into their house. I believe that the best thing we can do as Christians is to make up our mind ahead of time that we are going to be as peaceful as we can, and it will make a difference when it really happens.

Roth holds the key to Nazareth Village

Former Virginia resident and VMBM and Mennonite Mission Network worker, Shirley Roth, Executive Director of first-century Nazareth Village, is never sure who will pass through the doors of the exhibit center, and then move out onto the eight acres of land, walking the Parable Walk, and visiting the village homes. From over 50 countries of the world, evangelicals, Orthodox Christians, Catholics, Protestants, Jews and Muslims come to see this historically accurate reproduction of what life was like in a first-century Jewish village under Roman occupation—the way Jesus lived it.

So carefully recreated is the Village, that it has been drawing journalists and film crews from BBC and CBS news and interviewers from ABC's Nightline and NBC's Dateline as the setting for major stories and productions. Galilee school teachers have brought over 40,000 children—the majority of them Muslims—to walk the paths of Jesus' setting in the very town where he grew up and lived for 90% of his life. It is the only reproduction of a first-century synagogue in the world open for visitors.

Shirley Roth manages a staff of 20 persons including guides offering services in English, Arabic, German, Hebrew, Finnish, Spanish, Dutch, and Russian. She also oversees the training of volunteers from many countries. Shirley works alongside the manager of the Nazareth Village gift shop, an important conclusion for global visitors. (see sidebar)

Shirley's direction of the Village, now in its seventh year of operation, has additional management challenges not typical in other businesses: how to deal with the ebb and flow of Israeli/Palestinian tourism during another intifada/uprising, managing the financial responsibilities when political problems cut sharply into the numbers of visitors, and juggling the schedules of normal business deadlines and staffing schedules alongside the interruptions of government officials with tourism interests, pastors with tour groups, film producers with production crews, and all of the other activity that buzzes through this vibrant ministry project.

As Shirley strolls along Parable Way, she remembers Jesus who grew up in this little town, and how He impacted the world for the next 2,000 years and beyond. Even now during a time that the land is torn by ethnic and religious violence, Nazareth Village quietly and effectively presents the story of Jesus, the Prince of Peace.
