Peace Jam shows youth an alternative to violence

On Saturday, September 8th, the firstever Peace Jam took place in Newport News, Va.; Peace Jam 2007 was sponsored by Virginia Mennonite Conference and the LEAP program (Learning, Exploring, and Participating) of Eastern Mennonite Seminary. Nearly 100 youth, sponsors, presenters, and recruiters from Mennonite mission and peace agencies gathered at the Yoder Barn Theatre.

Referring to Jesus' calmness amidst the storm on the Sea of Galilee, Glen called for


Mennonites to preserve peace in all disputes and live a life directed by peace.



Joe Mininger: "a quiet giant"

Joe and Eleanor Mininger had begun their family in 1958 in eastern Pennsylvania, and were very busy with a masonry business, when they were drawn to a very different life in West Virginia. Dr. Samuel Bucher was married to Joe's sister, Margaret, and had begun the medical work in Harmon. The Buchers invited the Miningers to come and do maintenance for the clinic.

So began a sojourn of 49 years in the mountains of West Virginia that now

driver, farmer, mason, and pastor, were the venues for connecting to the communities.

Joe's parish ministry began long before he was credentialed as a pastor. Their youth ministry connected small groups of young people over several ridges and valleys. This ministry extended beyond the Mennonite congre-

gations.

The ecumenical aspects of the Mininger ministry included an annual community revival service that rotated among the various churches rather than each congregation doing its own thing. A son-in-law now sees

Joe as the "abbot" for the ecumenical community.

Joe's life of integrity, deep spirituality, and respect for persons gives us an example of "incarnational" faith. All eight of Joe and Eleanor's children are believers and committed to their various congregations. One of the sons recalls putting his ear to the door, when the ministers of the area were gathered in the Mininger front room, "to hear the prayers." Joe was known to pray aloud with the children on his school bus (an outrage these days), and it was received as a genuine extension of who he was.

The Miningers' love for the community they served meant they were never going to leave. So, arrangements were made with a small family cemetery on the edge of the farm where they lived and there Joe is buried. This unassuming, deeply spiritual, hospitable man built relationships that made faith attractive for hundreds. He turns out to be a quiet giant.

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CHOICES gives "the other side" of military enlistment

Since 1997, Dennis Boos has been involved in counterrecruitment efforts at a local High School in Raleigh. Dennis is the co-founder of the CHOICES program, which stands for Committee for High School Option and Information on Careers, Education and Self-Improvement.

At the beginning, Dennis worked at this through the previous Jubilee Peace Center of the Raleigh Mennonite

Church, and in concert with a local organization called Raleigh Peace Action. Through this program, volunteers like Dennis have set up a table during lunch periods 6-8 times per year where students pass and read brochures asking such questions as, "Do you know enough to enlist?" The goal has been to distribute information giving the other side that is not told by the military recruiters—exposing the reality of being in the military,

the truth about education and personal benefits received, and the reality of war.

Options to military service are also provided. Being personally at the tables allows for conversations with young people who may have not wrestled vet with what it really means to be a soldier. Students are sometimes surprised to hear that there are alternatives such as the Peace Corps, Job Corps, AmeriCorps, and other service organizations.

Through this program, a student contest has been held to design a peace-oriented book cover, and peace-related books have also been donated to a number of local high schools. Dennis serves as the Congregational Peace Advocate for Raleigh Mennonite Church. At the July Virginia Conference Assembly, he was awarded a Peace Mug in recognition of his work.

PROMESA in Peru: strengthening the cord of school ministry

Ron and Regina Shultz, and their children Hannah. Jeremiah, and Bethany, are serving the church and working at the school in Cusco, through EMM. Initiated by the vision of the Mennonite Church in Cusco. Peru. PROMESA is a Christian bilingual school. Regina's home congregation is Powhatan (Va.) Mennonite Church.

When Maria* began first grade at PROMESA (the Spanish word for promise, also an acronym for Programa Menonita de Educación en Sabiduría y Amor (Mennonite program of education in wisdom and love), she wasn't even able to write her name. There were concerns about the possibility of learning disabilities and how she might "survive" in a bilingual



school. We prayed for wisdom and decided that we would do our part, and then see how God would bring about changes in her life.

She began the school year as a very quiet little girl. Maria is the youngest of four children raised by a single mother. In search of work. Maria's mother has traveled to the jungle area on the

backs of produce trucks desperate to bring a meager income back to her family. As months went by, Maria's steady progress amazed us. The affirmation that she received enabled her to spread her newfound wings. At the end of the school year, Maria was reading and writing not only in Spanish, but in English as well.

Maria is one of twenty students at PROMESA who receives a quality Christian education because of the sponsorship program. Her mother is able to afford little more than the cost of the public bus that brings Maria from her small town to the school each day. With the dedicated support of her sponsor family and the loving commitment of the teachers and staff, Maria's future is much brighter than just a year ago. We continue to work at strengthening the three-fold cord that provides the safety net that our students need: the school, the family, and the church, working together to minister holistically to our students.

Retreat in Italy exceeds expectations

"This retreat was a taste of heaven!" How thrilling to hear this enthusiastic response. For several years we'd dreamed, prayed and planned for a week-long event for young adults and families of the Italian Mennonite Church. We envisioned a time to draw apart to focus on what is truly important and listen to God's voice.* God brought it to reality August 20-26, in Calabria (the "toe" of Italy), the halfway point between Palermo and Bari. A small hotel in a mountain village overlooking the sea hosted us.

The theme, "In Step With God's Design," was woven through morning devotions and the afternoon worship, presentations, and discussion groups. Mornings were free for sightseeing and recreation. Much joyful fellowship happened over 3-course Italian meals. Conversation, sharing and ministering to each other typically lasted late into the night.

Other comments by those attending:

- "I was afraid to participate because of a physical problem I struggle with (what would I do if I needed a doctor and none was available!) But I've felt wonderful here. I feel refreshed!"
- "At this retreat an enormous wound inside me began to heal. God used several persons who've passed through the same sorrow to minister deeply to me. After three years of struggle, I'm

- experiencing God's peace and fullness and am ready to serve Him once again with my life."
- "This is the first vacation my wife and I ever had! It's been a marvelous, unforgettable experience enjoying this time with other believers!"
- "At first we refused the invitation, thinking that we were too busy and financially stressed. But at the last minute another room became available in the hotel. God gave us another chance to enjoy this time of spiritual and physical rest that we desperately needed."
- A new believer said, "I've never experienced anything like this before. Thank you!"



The Senior High Youth of Trissels Mennonite Church had the wonderful opportunity to go on a week-long mission trip. This group, consisting of four leaders, nine youth, and baby Jordan, went through Partners in Mission to The Center for Student Missions site in Nashville, Tennessee. The group came away with new understandings of different cultures, the homeless, those battling drug addictions and a number of other topics. Through a number of projects, the group experienced moments that will forever be cherished. Each event contributed to an overall grand experience.

Each morning was spent studying the Bible, reflecting upon past experiences and preparing for upcoming

group and assisted the teachers in serving breakfast to the kids and helping to oversee small projects.

Everyday after lunch, the sites varied. The group worked in a warehouse packing boxes for Feed the Children, an organization that distributes emergency packages during times of disaster. Driving around for the Prayer Tour, the group was introduced to different sections of Nashville and prayed over each section of the city. At the Halfway House, where male drug addicts resided after jail, the group helped clean up the remains of a kitchen fire and listened to testimonies. The group connected with the homeless through Urban Exposure and Operation Hydration by handing out lunches and water. At the Campus for Human Development, the group heard testimonies from men who had made drastic changes to their daily abusive, addictive behavior. At The Next Door ministry site, an organization that helps women move back into society after jail, the group cleaned rooms that would soon house women. After these sites, the group was usually hungry, and various ethnic restaurants satisfied the appetites and gave each a taste of a different culture.

Since there was a lot going on in just a week's time, each evening the group bonded during debriefing.

Some shared personal experiences and how projects changed their perspective.

Through different activities, such as foot washing, the group was able to refocus on the theme of being a servant.

The mission week was a wonderful experience for the group, both for the leaders and youth. Everyone learned to be flexible and to be a servant. Each event contributed to a wonderful missions week.

This program was developed because the traditional school curriculum and settings were not working for him. Josh is the only person that this program serves at this time. However, we would love to further develop this program and add more clients to it in the near future.

The SDS program is part of transitional programming through Rockingham County Schools under the direction of Kendel St. John. This program is funded by the school system and has been uniquely individualized for Josh. He will learn skills he will need to prepare him for employment when he graduates. Another goal for Josh is independence. We would like him to become as independent as possible through the wide variety of day support

services offered through the SDS program.

I recently started working with Josh as Day Program Instructor. Josh and I work Monday through Friday from 9-3 or 9-2 for 27 hours a week, depending on the day.

Everyday, Josh works on different programs towards fulfilling his Individualized Education Plan (IEP) goals. On Mondays, Josh and I assist with the community Soup Kitchen in Harrisonburg. On Tuesdays and Thursdays, Josh and I cook lunch for the staff

at the Harrisonburg Day Support Services building, where my office is located. On Wednesdays, Josh and I complete his transit program. This program is necessary for Josh because with it, he will learn to get around Harrisonburg on the bus-in case he ever needs to use the bus system. Recently on Fridays, Josh and I have started traveling to Pleasant View's main office in Broadway. We help out at the Broadway Day Program with woodcrafts. Josh loves woodworking and was thrilled with the idea of helping his peers.

Josh and I constructed a hat rack for his room. It was our first project together and it turned out okay but we had a blast working on it together. Josh also loves animals and chose to volunteer at the SPCA on days when we have extra time in our schedule or when he requests that we work there since we want him to be able to make some decisions on his own and be as independent as possible.

I have learned a lot from Josh through my position as Day Program Instructor. I couldn't ask for a better job!
